

Every child has been given a catalogue from the Scholastic International Book Club. The Club is


a great way to get children reading. Pupils can choose from a fantastic range of discounted books from around the world. If you would like to place an order to purchase any of the books in the cata-

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On 24<sup>th</sup> October Year 6E and both Year 4 classes went on a visit to **Carnuntum Archaeological Park** in Austria, where they visited the small but excellent museum and a Roman village, where there are reconstructed buildings on an original Roman settlement. The homes of wealthy and less wealthy Romans have been reconstructed in an extremely authentic way and the children were fascinated to see in 3D the things they have seen in books and on a screen.

Some of the comments as we walked around were: "Now I really understand what the houses were like"; "The Roman technology was amazing"; "I didn't realise that the Romans invented central heating" and amusingly having visited the communal public toilets, "I think it would be fun to sit on a toilet and have a chat!".

Year 5 had a trip to the **Water Museum** as they are studying Water in Geography. It was very interesting. They learnt about how water gets to our homes, how wells are built and why it is safe to drink tap water in Bratislava. In the



picture they are standing on the oldest and biggest well on Sihoť Island.



At the end of the visit we went to the partly rebuilt amphitheatre and some of the children certainly enjoyed pretending to be gladiators similar to the ones we had seen in a video on a huge screen at the Roman village – a wonderful example of 21<sup>st</sup> century technology helping us to understand the history of 2000 years ago. ## Your children in action

Take a look at how your children learn, participate in projects or group activities, and spend time in the school in general.

### Year 3M – Character Study

In Science, pupils from **Year 4S** and **4H** have been completing research about the three different states of matter: solid, liquid and gas. Pupils used their bodies to create a 'freeze frame' of how the particles in each state behave.

Solids are made of particles which are packed together very tightly and are fixed in place. Liquids are made of particles that are not packed as

tightly. This means that a liquid can take up different

shapes.

The particles in a gas, however, are very loosely joined together so that they can

## **Reading mentoring**


