How do they come to life and who writes them? It was so interesting to investigate the life of books and visit a place where the books sleep and wait for their new owners. Tall and colorful book shelves, typical scent of printed paper and friendly faces of book shop assistants. We learned how to gently touch the new books, how to turn pages and we experienced the exciting moment of buying a new book for our class. And we did not forget to take turns in carrying the shopping bag with our new book friend on the way back to the kindergarten. Guess what we will read today before nap time?

OUR CLASS PROJECTS



In a week of favourite stories the Koalas made 2 group projects. Girls love princesses and castles, boys prefer superheroes. How to make a compromise? Easily...girls worked on beautiful magic wands decorated with glitters while boys created a bean stalk for their hero to climb up to the sky. Do you know what stories they talked about? 🙂

The Whales created their own stories in a quite untraditional way... with the help of picture cubes. They rolled 9 dice and told the story that had to include the pictures on the top of the cubes. Let's read one of them:

"Once upon a time was a pyramid and in the pyramid was a telephone and in the telephone was a bridge. And then in the water was there a turtle and the sheep did say to the turtle. "Be, be, what are you doing there?" And the turtle said: "I'm swimming, because it's my water." And then the world did turn around and they did fall down and then the arrow did bump to the pyramid and then it was locked the pyramid, but it couldn't go there... and then people that were there just said: "Help! Help!" Let's go out there! The End."



The Zebras also created their own stories. But first they practiced their sequencing skills... their job was to put the given pictures in the correct order and tell the story. Here is one:

"Once upon a time the girl decided to paint something but then with her hands she did push all the paint and it did go to her picture and then it splashed all around to the garden and everywhere to the everything and then the girl did... was eating and watching the paint. And then she did put her hands inside and then she did make the stamp. And then her face was all paint because she put her hands there and then she did go to the bathroom to wash it in the bath and then that's the end."

Drama and re-acting the stories, whether made up or the ones from our real lives, are also the part of literary education. And, oh gosh!, kids DO love role plays... That's what the Butterflies used to go through basic table manners. One roleplay was a dinner at home with their family. Then they pretended that they were in a restaurant where a waiter/waitress took an order. Children learned that we keep the elbows off the table while eating, that one doesn't slurp soup or drinks, that we start eating when everyone else does - or when given the okay to start, that we don't make bad comments about the food and we don't reach



over someone's plate for something we politely ask that the item be passed t o us. Children enjoyed this activity very much and so it was made a corner for play.



The Elephants got some very interesting visitors one day. The kids from the CIS school came just before the nap time to read them a bedtime story.

Oh, how excitedly they all listened. And how motivated to learn how to read they all got! ⁽²⁾ Example of others (especially older friends ⁽ⁱ⁾) is usually the best motivation we can build upon. Thank you, schoolers!

Crickets The dedicated one week to work on their own books. They made their title and cover page, they described the basic plot and worked precise-



ly on every page until their books were fully done. As a home project, they brought to class their favourite book and they "read" it to each other. They showed a high level of narrative skills, it was clear that some of them have practiced it at home \odot .







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

They decided to look into this a bit further and so they compared them. They created a dictionary - they chose subjects they were interested into, drew pictures, and added the words. The best part was to listen to the pronunciation on Google translator. 🙂 Well, that's another way to study languages.







Once again, this year we found out that children just love skating! The Reception and Y1 classes from both locations did not mind getting up early in the morning, every day for one week, just to put on their skating gear and head to the ice stadium. 


